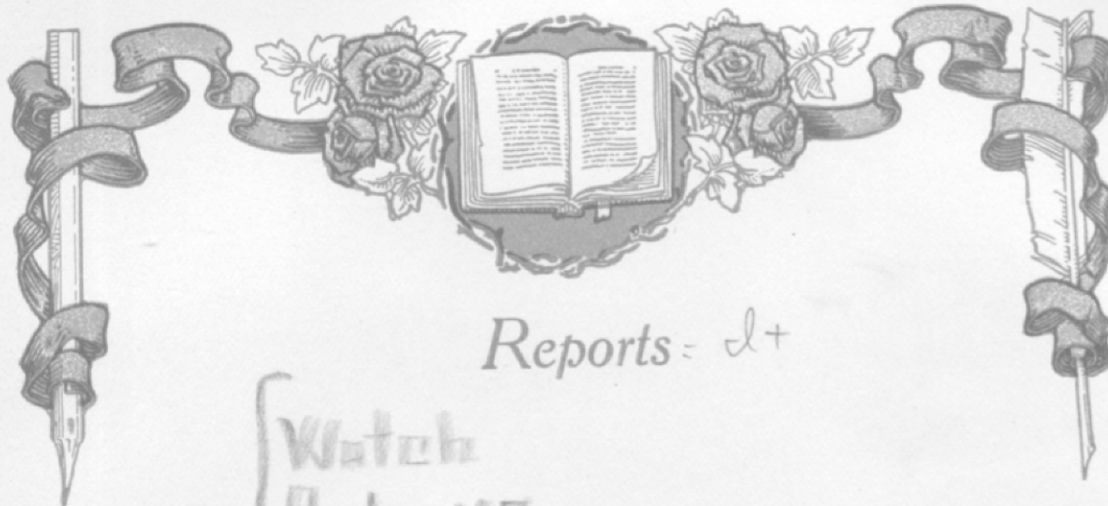

Mrs. Harry Martin and daughter Ava who are attending school at Springfield spent the week end in Ava with home folks. They were accompanied on their return by Misses Maxine Martin, Dora Wilson and Florence Silvey who attended the music festival at teachers college Monday.

Miss Florence Silvey of the Ava High School and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. M. F. Silvey, won first place in the girls vocal solo contest at the 8th. annual high school musical festival at the Southwest Teachers College in Springfield, Monday evening. Miss Silvey sang "Suppose a Rose Were You" by Dennee. Other schools competing for the same honor were Alba, Aurora, Carterville, Humansville, Ozark, Eldorado Springs, Neosho, Seymour, Urbana, Houston, West Plains, Republic, Richland, St. Clair and Willow Springs.

The Ava High School had three contestants in the Music Festival held at Springfield last Monday, May 5. They were Florence Silvey, vocal solo; Harold Pettit, vocal solo; Dora Wilson, piano solo. We are proud of all of our contestants, but especially of Florence Silvey who won first place and received the gold medal. There were seven contestants in the preliminaries and two in the finals every one of whom was excellent. This is the first year that Ava has been represented in musical activities and we are confident that it will not be the last.

Daddy says "Now don't you try to sing tomorrow if you're hoarse like you are now." "Well, I wait." We got there at 5:30 P. M. Mr. Hargis and I went to depot to meet Mary Jane, Harold and Ray. We met them.

Next morning we went at 8:30 to try out. I got a place in final winning 2nd place in preliminary. Then we went to town & bought my white shoes and Dad & Mother & Turner were there. That night I sang. "Oh, what a feeling to go on that big stage." Could only my "love one" been with me, and could have been if only had known. I won first place in vocal. I saw ticked Ray was. He grabbed me and almost caved my ribs in - but H. H. P. was going to carry me home but he didn't quite do it. Altho' he took me & Mary & Ray. The boys left at 1:00 walked home didn't they. We came home the next day with Max & H. H. P. and Dora Lee.

The admission will be 25 cents for people outside of school, and only 10 cents for school children.

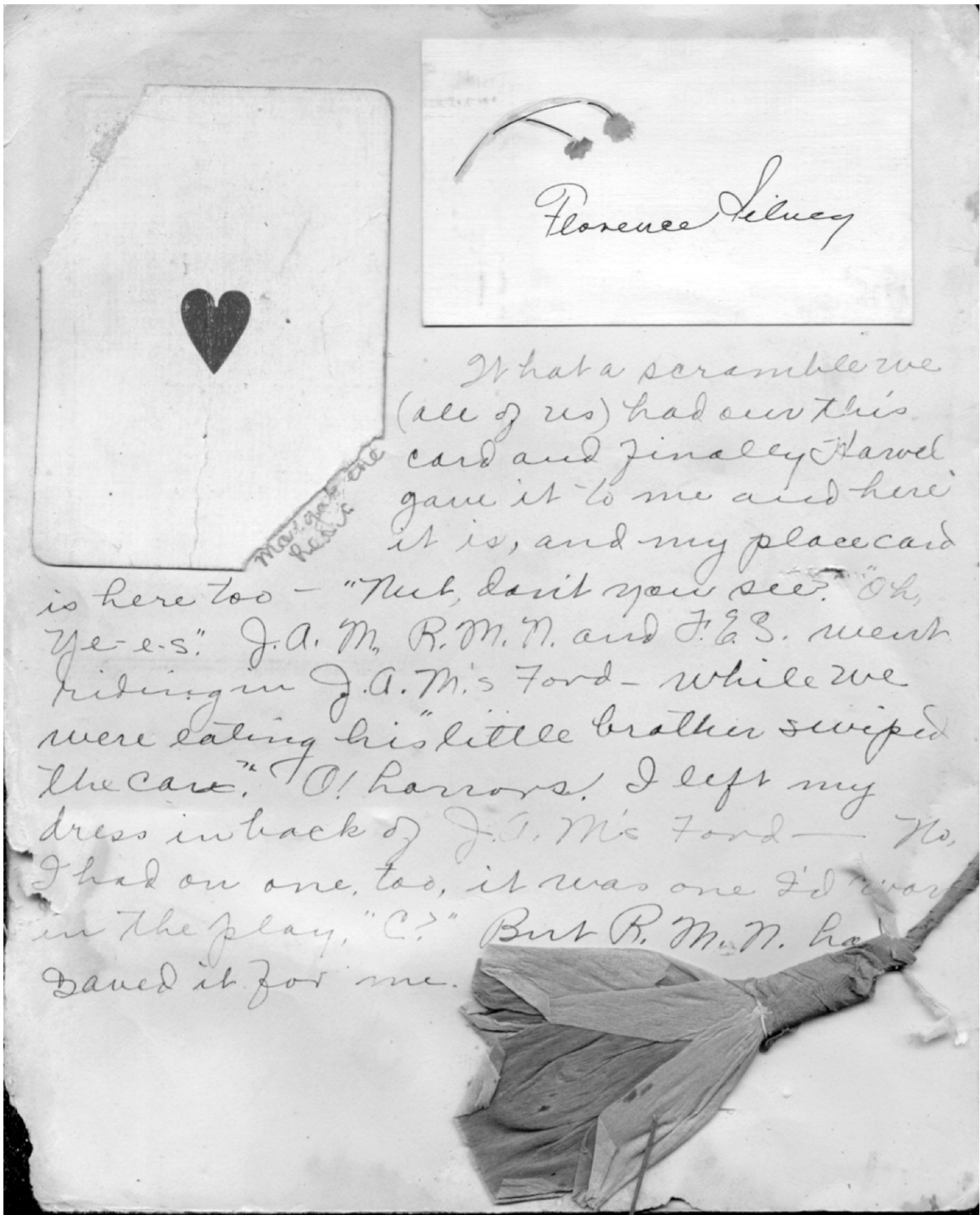
