I Primary Sources

A Manuscript Collections

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Dallas County, Alabama, Deed Books. Books A to Q examined. Dallas County Court House, Selma, Alabama.

Department of State Papers, Consular Dispatches, Havana. Includes one significant letter from William Sharkey to William L. Marcy (March 26, 1853,) about King's inauguration in Cuba. National Archives.

Department of State Papers, Dispatches from United States Ministers to France. Part of Volume 30 deals with King's French mission; it includes all dispatches and enclosures he sent to the State Department during the mission. National Archives.

Department of State Papers, Dispatches from United States Ministers to Great Britain. The volume dealing with the Edward Everett mission contains his comments about French affairs while King was in France. National Archives.

Department of State Papers, Dispatches from United States Ministers to Russia. Volume dealing with the William Pinkney mission includes letters by and about King. National Archives.

Department of State Papers, Instructions to Ministers in France. Includes instructions to King 1844-1846. National Archives.

Faculty Record [of the University of North Carolina] 1799-1814. Contains information about the University of North Carolina during King's student days. Southern Historical Collection, University of North Carolina.

Great Britain, Public Record Office, London, Foreign Office 115, Volume 88, and Foreign Office 5, Volumes 404-429. Includes dispatches and instructions to and from the British Foreign Office during King's mission to France. Photostats in Manuscripts Division, Library of Congress.

- Legislative Records, Senate. Vast collection of miscellaneous material, including a few important letters to King. National Archives.
- Letterbooks of the Alabama Governors. Books examined for period 1819-1853. Includes a few letters from King and instructions to him in his capacity as senator. Alabama Department of Archives and History.
- Minutes of the Philanthropic Society. Three volumes of the manuscript minutes of the society cover the period of King's membership from 1801-1804. Southern Historical Collection, University of North Carolina.
- Minutes of the Selma Land Company. Manuscript volume recording the activities of the company which founded Selma, Alabama. Alabama Department of Archives and History.
- North Carolina Legislative Papers, Senate. Papers for 1785 include a petition from King's father, William King. North Carolina Department of Archives and History.
- North Carolina Revolutionary War Accounts. Volume five records payments for the militia service of William King. North Carolina Department of Archives and History.
- Philanthropic Society Papers. A collection of miscellaneous correspondence of the society, including several letters from King. Southern Historical Collection, University of North Carolina.
- Post Office Department Letterbooks. Fifty volumes of these letterbooks cover the period of King's public career. Many letters to King are included, mostly of little importance. National Archives.
- Records of the Receivers Office at Milledgeville, 1818. Manuscript volume recording land sales in Alabama, including King's purchases in 1818. Alabama Department of Archives and History.
- Sampson County, North Carolina, Deed Books. Books 3-20 and A-E examined. Sampson County Court House, Clinton, North Carolina.
- Sampson County Tax List for 1784. North Carolina Department of Archives and History.
- Treasury Department. Letters from Congress. Volumes dated 1832-1834 and 1840-1842 contain a few letters from King. National Archives.

Treasury Department. Letters to individual Members of Congress. Books 1-5 include many letters to King about patronage and banking problems. These letters show that King exerted a strong influence in the Jacksonian period. National Archives.

University Student Records 1795-1809. Manuscript volume containing reports of tutors and of examining committees at the University of North Carolina. Southern Historical Collection, University of North Carolina.

2 Personal

Matthew P. Blue Collection. 2,500 items, including letters from King and other leading figures of his day. Alabama Department of Archives and History.

James Buchanan Papers. 25,000 items, including letters, reports, documents, pamphlets, etc. Many letters are included to and from King. An indispensable source for this study. Historical Society of Pennsylvania.

David Campbell Papers. 8,038 items and 32 volumes. Includes letters describing the Alabama constitutional convention of 1819, with several references to King. Duke University Library.

George W. Campbell Papers. Includes one letter from King to David Hubbard in 1844. Manuscripts Division, Library of Congress.

Clay Papers. A vast collection containing the papers of Clement Comer Clay and Clement Claiborne Clay. Includes several references to King. Duke University Library.

John Coffee Papers. 1,547 items. Mostly correspondence between Coffee and prominent men of his day. Includes a few letters from King. Alabama Department of Archives and History.

Thomas Butler Cooper Collection. A thin folder including one letter from King and letters from Cooper to his wife describing senatorial elections in the state legislature. Alabama Department of Archives and History.

William Duffy Collection. A small collection of papers of King's legal preceptor. No reference to King. North Carolina Historical Commission.

Frank M. Etting Collection. 20,000 items, including one letter from King to Nicholas Biddle dated 1824. Historical Society of Pennsylvania.

- Simon Gratz Collection. 175,000 items, including several letters from King and several good portraits of him. Historical Society of Pennsylvania.
- Bolling Hall Collection. 1,178 pieces, including letters from King and other prominent men of his day. Alabama Department of Archives and History.
- Joseph D. Hamilton Collection. Includes a manuscript listing the King family and tracing its genealogy. Southern Historical Collection, University of North Carolina.
- Henry W. Hilliard Collection. Two thin folders including printed and manuscript material about King. Alabama Department of Archives and History.
- Andrew Jackson Papers. A vast collection of personal, political, and military correspondence. Contains no letters to or from King, but includes references to him. Manuscripts Division, Library of Congress.
- Thomas Sidney Jesup Papers. 17 letter file boxes, 7 manuscript boxes and 2 volumes of letterbooks. Includes one letter from King to Buchanan. Manuscripts Division, Library of Congress.
- William Rufus King Collection. A limited collection of personal, business, and political correspondence along with a brief manuscript journal written in 1816. This collection is disappointingly small, but is nevertheless vital to this study. Alabama Department of Archives and History.
- William Rufus King Collection. Contains many clippings, some contemporary and some of a more recent date. Carnegie Library, Selma, Alabama.
- William Rufus King Papers in the private possession of Laurence Tipton, Selma, Alabama. Includes one letter from King and a great deal of material of a later date.
- Last Will and Testament of William King, Sampson County, North Carolina. North Carolina Collection, University of North Carolina.
- Miscellaneous Personal Papers. Includes one letter from King to Asbury Dickins. Manuscripts Division, Library of Congress.
- Phillip Phillips Papers. Small collection of manuscript material, including several letters from King to Phillips. Manuscripts Division, Library of Congress.

Albert J. Pickett Papers. Papers of Alabama's pioneer historian, including one letter from King. Alabama Department of Archives and History.

Franklin Pierce Papers. A vast collection. A few letters dealing with the reaction of Pierce's friends to King's nomination as his running mate were useful in this study. Manuscripts Division, Library of Congress.

Charles Tait Papers. An extensive collection of manuscript material, including several letters dealing with Alabama politics and the senatorial elections of 1819 and 1822. Alabama Department of Archives and History.

John D. Terrell Collection. Several folders of correspondence, including three unimportant letters from King. Alabama Department of Archives and History.

Martin Van Buren Papers. 72 volumes and 8 portfolios. Includes one letter from King and numerous references to him. Manuscripts Division, Library of Congress.

John W. Walker Papers. An extensive collection including letters to and from members of the Walker family, but it has only a few indirect references to King. Alabama Department of Archives and History.

William Lowndes Yancey Collection. Contains a few letters referring to King, along with pamphlet and newspaper material about him. Alabama Department of Archives and History.

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
